AFTER ACTION BATTLE REPORT 736TH TANK BATTALION 1 May - 31 May 1945

1 - 5 May

On 30 April 1945, Task Force RITCHIE, commanded by Lieutenant Celenel PAUL J. RITCHIE, Commanding Officer, 736th Tank Battalien, was formed as a Mebile Reserve for the 83rd Infantry Division's Bridgehead acress the ELBE River. Head-quarters and Headquarters Cempany, attached to Task Force Ritchie meved to WALTER-NIENBERG (D886823). The Assault Gun Plateen was placed in a Defensive Position in vicinity of GODNITY (D874856) with the mission of guarding the approach to the North Bridge (D864817) acress the ELBE River; the Mortar Plateen was located in GLINDE (D826868) with the mission of shelling acress the ELBE River in vicinity of RAINES (D808877).

Company "A" attached to 329th Infantry Regiment remained in a static position across the ELBE River with Plateon dispositions as fellows - 1st Flatoon at NUTHA (C943824); 2nd Plateon at CUTERCLUCK (C924842); 3rd Plateon at ZERBST (D990842); while Headquerters Plateon and "A" Company CP was located at WALTERNIENBERG (C885-823). In this sector no opposition or activity had been received from the enemy, but large numbers of prisoners approached outposts to "give up en-masse."

Company "B" attached to 330th Infantry Regiment maintained a Defensive Position across the ELBE River as part of Task Force Ritchie, with Plateon dispositions as fellows - 2nd Plateon was attached to Company "C", 330th Infantry Regiment, acting as Regimental Reserve for 330th Infantry Regiment; Company "B" (-2nd Plateon) with "B" Company 330th Infantry Regiment was part of Task Force Ritchie with the mission of reinforcing 330th Infantry Regiment in case of counterattack or reinforcing any other sector as ordered by the Task Force Commander. On 5th of May Company "B", -736th Tank Battalien, was alerted to move to NEUNDORF; 2nd Plateon was relieved from attachment to Company "C" 330th Infantry Regiment and reverted to Company centrel. Task Force Ritchie at this time had been diselved and the Company moved to NEUNDORF on 5th of May 1945.

Company "C" maintained a Defensive Position across the ELBE River with the 1st Plateon attached to 331st Infantry Regiment at BADEZ, placed on a half hour alort and remained so until 5 May 1945. The Company (-1st Plateon) was in position at WALTERNIENBERG where Task Force Rogers was formed. Task Force Rogers was composed as follows - Company "C" (-1st Plateon); 1st Plateon of Company "D"; and Company "L" 331st Infantry Regiment under the command of Captain GLYNN O. ROGERS. Task Force Rogers was assembled in vicinity of WALTERNIENBERG in a Mobile Reserve and placed on a half hour alort for the purpose of holding open the Corridor to the 125th Cavalry Squadron, who were meeting the Russian Spearhead. This alort continued through the 4th of May 1945.

Company "D" during the period 1 May to 5 May 1945 was in position at WALTER-NIENBERG as a Mebile Reserve for Task Force Ritchie.

Service Company remained in position at CALBE (D782751), supplying the Battalion.

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The Medical Detaciment remained in position at WALTLANIENBERG (D889823), with the exception of Medical Teams that were assigned to various Companies throughout the Battalien. Sick call was held to a minimum, with the exception of the usual transportation difficulties of the unit's widely separated positions.

At 1630, 4 May 1945 Major MAURICE H. RAHE, Battalion S-3, received notification by phone from Major HARIMAN, Division G-3 that the 330th Infantry Regiment had contacted the Russians in the vicinity of D950950 and had ever run an Allied PW Cage at ALLENGRABOW (B040090).

On the 4th of May Task Force Ritchie was disselved. "A" Company remained attached to 329th Infantry Regiment, but was relieved from its Defensive Pesitions only after direct contact with the Russians had been established. "B" Company remained attached to 330th Infantry Regiment. "C" Company remained attached to 331st Infantry Regiment and "D" Company remained under Battalion centrel.

On 4 May all Companies except "A" Company returned to Battalien centrel and prepared to move to new locations. The Battalien CP was opened at CALBE (D782751); "B" Company at NEUNDORF; "C" Company at BARBY (D850825); "D" Company at CALBE (D782751); While "A" Company's disposition was as follows - Headquarters and 1st Plateon at WEEELEBEN; 3rd Plateon at ZERBST; 2nd Plateon attached to 329th Infantry Regiment at HALBER-STEDT (D455775).

Lieutenant Celenel PAUL J. RITCHIE was awarded a Brenze Oakleaf Cluster to the Brenze Star en the 4th of May

6 May

At an Officer's meeting at the Battalien CP in CALBE Lt Cel RITCHIE informed these present that the Battalien's mission was to establish and operate as Military Gevernment. For this new mission, the Battalien was assigned to Division Artillary. Upon receipt of orders, the Battalien moved as a unit from their former locations to WOLFENBUTTLE (C917998), where the Battalien CP was set up. The Companies moved into the following Towns - "Headquarters Company - WOLFENBUTTLE (C918887); "A" Company - VALLSTEDT (X795055); "B" Company - THIEDE (C881026); "C" Company - GR DENKT (C970980); "D" Company - AHLUM (X960010); Service Company and Medical Detachment - WOLFENBUTTLE (C917998) and were assigned areas to be Governed.

7 May - 9 May

Companies, on 7 May, spent the day performing First Echolon of Maintenance on their vehicles, functional duties and preparing to Govern their assigned area. Lt Col RITCHIE, at a Staff Meeting held 8 May informed these present that the Battalien was relieved from attachment to Division Artillery and attached to 330th Infantry Regiment as of 0800, 8 May 1945. This new mission was to occupy and govern the area new under centrel of the 41st Armored Infantry and 66th Armored Regiments. The Battalien then moved to new locations as follows - Headquarters, Headquarters Company and Medical Detachment - LICHTENBERG (C748995); "A" Company - LESSE (C725989); "B" Company - GUSTEDT (C960915); "C" Company - KL HEERE (C718867); "D" Company - SILLIUM (C671888); Service Company - STEINLAM (C776895) Upon arriving at these locations the Companies begain to set up their Military Government Policies and Precedures, performing First Echolon of Maintenance, Resting and Refitting Troops. Instructions regarding Civilians were passed out to Companies and the problem of de-nazifying Gormany began with apprehension of several SS troops, Farty Members, inspecting records of Buergermeisters that were under the control of the

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Battalien, and last but not least to attempt to restore Germany as a Democratic Nation - within the areas assigned to the Battalien.

10 May - 19 May

Company "B" was relieved from assignment of governing OLBER (C713921); respensibility was assumed by "D" Company. Provious to this, "B" Company was assigned a very large area to Gevern and almost every man was either en guard er pulling double shifts. The change of assignment of ar eas provided for a better means of equalizing responsibility throughout the Battalien and gave each Company an eppertunity to rest and refit treeps. On the 12th of May each member of the Battalien saw the leng awaited film "Two Down and One To Go" and the VE Day film which previded for a better understanding of the "Foint System" that Govern the Redepleyment and Readjustment of Treeps. Parties were held by all Companies in their respective areas, celebrating VE Day. All mevies were held in Headquarters Company Mess Hall. On the 13th of May another change in responsibility of areas had taken place - "B" Company was relieved from the assignment of governing the town of KL ELBE (C732895) and responsibility was assumed by "C" Company. Ist Lt JAMES CROWLEY, assigned to "A" Company left for a furlough to the United States. During the remainder of the period up to 19th May the Battalion was primarily engaged in Military Government and guarding of vital installations; Tours were conducted through Herman GOering works and movie pictures were shown as eften as pessible. This was the only form of entertainment available for the treeps.

On the 19th of May, Headquarters and Headquarters Company left LICHTINBERG to proceed to BADDECKENSTEDT (C719901) to assume central of new areas assigned the Battalien by higher Headquarters. Headquarters and Headquarters Company were billeted in BADDECKENSTEDT with the exception of the Mortar Plateen which was billeted in BINDER (C68912) and assigned a task of providing road blocks in the vicinity of BINDER. "A" Company remained in LESSE (C725989) to continue with their assigned mission of governing that area. "B" Company remained in GUSTEDT (C960915) to continue with their assigned mission of governing that area. "C" Company moved to SEHLDE (C735855) to assume responsibility of Military Government. Service Company moved to KL HEERE (C718887) to assume responsibility of Military Government. "D" Company moved to WALTWIESCHE (C740040) to continue with their mission of Military Government, while the Medical Detachment moved to EADDECKENSTEDT.

20 May - 21 May

Upon arriving in new areas, all Companies in addition to occupying and governing their assigned areas, began the task of re-painting and re-servicing all vehicles. Training schedules were placed in effect, softball teams (inter-Battalien) were organized under the supervision of Capt CLYNN O. ROGERS, six (6) hour passes were established and a quota of men from each Company began daily visits to BAD HARZEURG for recreational purposes.

22 May - 24 May

The Battalien during this period carried on with its primary mission of Military Government. Persennel not engaged were following a Battalien Training Schedule. Fereign vehicles that were in the Battalien were turned ever to Battalien Supply to be evacuated to Ordnance Depots. Lt Col RITCHIE received notification by phone that the Battalien would be prepared to participate in a Coremeny held in hener of high ranking Russian Generals, who were guests of the Commanding General, XIII Corps, 26 May 1945.

Lt Cel PAUL J. RITCHIE presented awards to the fellowing Officer and Enlisted Men, 24 May 1945:

25 May - 27 May

T/Sgt Walter F. Layman and T/S Anthony J. Nasimente, Headquarters Cempany, returned to duty after a seven day pass in Paris and reported that they had been involved in an automebile accident on the return trip. Capt BURTON C. POTTER, who had attended the Information and Education School was also returning to the Battalion with T/Sgt Layman and T/S Nasimente with a 1 ten truck, and in the accident Capt POTTER received injuries about the head and was evacuated to a Hospital. Capt POTTER is expected to return to duty within ten days.

2nd Lt JERALD E. SMITH, Plateen Leader of the Assault Gun Plateen was premeted to 1st Lt per par 3, SO #136, Headquarters, 9th US Army, dated 16 May 1945.

28 May

A quota of Inlisted Mon and Officers of the Battalien left for VALKENBERG and MAASTRICHT, Helland on three day recreational passes. Capt MORDIE I. GARBER was placed in charge of the group of Officers and Enlisted Men.

A Shewdewn inspection of Chemical, Engineer, Medical and Signal Preperty was held throughout the Battalion. Orders were received from 83rd Infantry Division that an Advance Detail would be prepared to move to new location to arrange for billets for the Battalion. Companies were notified and the contemplated detail of three men from each Company, and one man from Medical Defachment, and one efficer were selected. The Advance Detail was to be prepared to move no later than 31 May 1945.

29 May

The Battalion prepared to turn ever Military Gevernment responsibility to British Authorities as per orders from higher Headquarters and relief is expected 30 May 1945. The 30th of May, being Memorial Day, plans were drawn up to held an appropriate Ceremeny for the Battalien on the Parade Grounds just eppesite Battalien Headquarters in EADDECKENSTEDT.

30 May

At 1100 hours the Battalion was formed on the Parade Grounds. The blank ammunition that was to be used by three assault guns in firing a salute was ebtained without too much difficulty and arrived just fifteen minutes prior to the Coremonies. At the Coremony, Lt Col PAUL J. RITCHIE, presented The Bronse Star Medal to the following Officers and Enlisted Men of the Battaliens

Major MAURICE H. RAHE - For meritorious service Capt WILLARD L. THOMPSON - For Meritorious Service 1st Lt HUCH ROWLAND - For Bravery in Action 1st Lt BENJAMIN T. RODINI - For Meritorious Service 2nd Lt JAMES J. PYSHER - For Meritorious Service

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T/Sgt Arthur J. McGuire - For Meriterious Service - C Company S/Sgt Marion L. Campbell - For Bravery in Action - B Company S/Sgt Jeseph Driscell - For Meriterious Service - Med Det Sgt Rebert S. Lamneck - For Bravery in Action - A Company Sgt Rebert L. Parker - For Bravery in Action - A Company Sgt Alden E. Reinhart - For Bravery in Action - A Company T/5 Alfred C. English - For Meriterious Service - Hq Company Pfc Alfred H. Cezario - For Bravery in Action - Med Det

After the presentation of the Awards, a fitting tribute was paid to the members of the Battalion who had given their lives during the Battalion's participation in combat. Lt HALLINAN, Battalion Adjutant, read the names, after which a velley of three rounds were fired from 105 Assault Guns under the supervision of Capt GLYNN O. ROGERS, Taps were then seunded in a final tribute to these brave men.

The Battalien then assembled to hear the Principal Address which was given by Lt Cel RITCHIE. At the cenclusion of the Ceremony, Companies returned to their respective billet areas.

31 May

The American Red Cress Clubmebile visited the various Companies throughout the Battalion to serve doughnets and coffee. Major MAURICE H. RAHE, conferred with British Officials regarding relief of Military Government responsibility. By 2400 hours, all Companies with the exception of "D" Company had been relieved by the British - "D" Troop, 212 Group, 64th Medium Regiment, RA. It is expected that "D" Company will be relieved shortly.

Excess Ordnance ammunition and Chemical ammunition was turned into Eattalion Supply. Expendible equipment form mechanized Flamethrowers was turned into C3rd Division Chemical Officer.

All wehicles are being prepared for movement, but maintenance and training will continue through 4th of June 1945. Warning Orders from 83rd Infantry Division were issued to prepare to move on or about 5 June 1945. Contemplated plans for movement - tanks will proceed to new destination by rail while personnel and whosled wehicles will travel by read.
